The Music Bach's Series, formerly the Bach's Lunch Series, will host Heatbox as the first performance of the 2011-12 season from 11:30 a.m. – 1 p.m. Friday, Oct. 28, in the Alumni Memorial Union. Heatbox is one-man entertainment system that combines Motown, a cappella, R&B, hip-hop, soul and funk. He has gained national attention with his live, in-the-moment music, which uses no tracks, samples or pre-recorded music. Each song and performance are distinctly unique. Music Bach's is now organized by the Office of Student Activities and Commuter Services.

The Concert and Lecture Series will begin at 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 16, with a pops concert by the Toledo Symphony Orchestra. The orchestra will be conducted by Jeffrey Pollock, resident conductor. The performance will feature "Tara" from "Gone with the Wind" and "Gonna Fly Now" from "Rocky," as well themes from "The Godfather" and "Jurassic Park." Kirk Toth will be the violin soloist. The performance will be held at the Winebrenner Theological Seminary TLB Foundation Convocations Center. Tickets are \$25 for adults, \$20 for senior citizens and \$10 for students. Admission for UF undergraduate and graduate students is free, but a ticket is required. UF faculty

2. Academic Update

The 17,000-square-foot brick building at the corner of Trenton Avenue and Morey Avenue, which once housed operations for printing pew envelopes and church stationery for Hubbard Press, is the new home for the College of Health Professions' Department of Diagnostic Services' offices, classrooms and laboratories. Renovations and remodeling were completed during the summer, and the medical laboratory science, nuclear medicine technology and the positron emission tomography/computed tomography (PET/CT) programs are operating out of the new space. In addition, the space will provide a place for additional diagnostic imaging programs, including ultrasound and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). Renovation of the building was divided into three phases. Phases one and two were completed during the summer and included the creation of offices, classrooms and laboratories. Phase three, which involves the entire back third of the building, will be completed next summer for the ultrasound and MRI programs. An open house will be held during Homecoming, Oct. 14-15.

The University of Findlay-School Articulation (UF-USA) program recently earned the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) accreditation, which identifies high-quality programs from across the nation offering college courses taught in high schools by high school teachers. UF-USA provides continuing professional development for participating high school teachers, bridging gaps that could occur as they continue to practice and are away from the newest developments in their fields. Findlay works with 120 teachers in 46 districts and served 1,200 students last year. Students who participate in the program can seamlessly enter UF as freshmen after high school, or transfer their college credits elsewhere. The Gupta Business Faculty Global Studies Endowment Fund was established to help support business faculty members who are interested in traveling abroad to learn more about other cultures and business environments. This summer, seven College of Business faculty members traveled to China, the world's largest exporter and nearly the biggest supplier of manufactured goods globally. Patricia Abels, D.B.A., Gregory Arburn, Ph.D., Douglas Asbury, Andrew Dehnhoff, Maria Gamba, Josephine Kershaw, Ph.D., and Joseph Martelli, D.I.T., wanted to become better acquainted with the BRIC (Brazil, Russia, India and China) nations, which are among the biggest and fastest growing emerging markets in the developing world. While in China, the group met with representatives of Chinese universities and visited several businesses. During a sight-seeing tour, they saw the world's largest power station, the Three Gorges Dam.



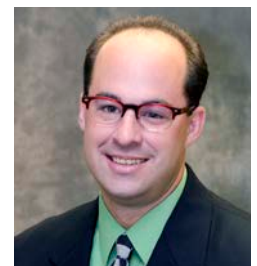

Making music with mathematics, Pam Warton, Ph.D., mathematics chair, used a software program to generate permutations of musical notes to create a new musical composition.

Pam Warton, Ph.D., associate professor and chair of mathematics, is both a mathematician and a musician, and this summer, she brought her talents together in an unexpected fusion of the two disciplines. Warton, who has played the violin since she was 7 years old, applied mathematical permutations to the notes and rhythms found in six widely recognized measures of “Spring,” from Vivaldi’s “Four Seasons.” The arrangement she used was written for a quartet, so there were four music parts to which she applied the permutations. “The harmonies were maintained through the permutations, and the beats were fun,” said Warton. “The music, for the most part, became completely unrecognizable, but it turned out to be surprisingly pleasing.” In simple terms, a permutation is an ordered arrangement of items. Warton assigned the seven notes on a music scale a number, and then used a software program to generate the permutations of those numbers, or notes. Once the permutations were generated, Warton used a music composition software program to create the new versions of “Spring” for each of the four parts in the music. Warton’s mathematical area of expertise is group theory, of which permutations are an important part. She presented her project, “When Worlds Collide: Composing New Music from Old Using Mathematics,” at Math Fest, an international conference organized by the Mathematical Association of America, in Lexington, Ky. Warton has been asked to share her presentation with other universities. In October, the University will host the Ohio section of the Mathematical Association of America for its regional conference. Wilkin Chair of the College of Liberal Arts, Matthew Stolick, Ph.D., associate professor of philosophy, will devote one year of study to the interdisciplinary exploration of a single topic – The Power of Play: Essential to Human Being. Campus and community members are invited to participate in a bi-weekly reading group which will meet from 6-7:30 p.m. on Thursdays beginning Sept. 8 in the AMU Endly Room. The twelve chapters of “Homo Ludens: A Study of the Play Element in Culture” by Johan Huizinga will provide the structure for this group that will

meet every two weeks and have a different UF faculty member lead discussion on play and their discipline. Stolick believes that unstructured play is important to our quality of life but it is being eliminated from our structured lives. Some of his goals for the year-long project include increasing awareness that play is learning; encouraging unorganized play for children; inspiring a sense of playfulness in the work environment; and inspiring people to commit to living playful lives and careers. 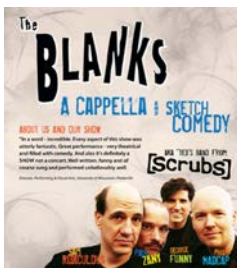

4. Alumni Spotlight

Jon A. Hart: Community Gardens Address Local Hunger

Jon Hart '08 has a heart for students, a passion for growing local food and compassion for the disadvantaged. In an amazing way, he is intertwining these into a single focus.

Hart worked at Glenwood Middle School in Findlay, first as an aide with Findlay After and Before School Sessions (FABSS) for four years while he was earning a degree in education, and then taught computer literacy and assisted in reading intervention for three years. Five years ago, he was asked to develop a garden on a small plot of land at Glenwood, approximately 120 feet by 6 feet, which was weedy and difficult to mow.

Hart took on the project with the help of four student volunteers. They planted flowers and vegetables with donated seed. The garden produced abundantly, so they gave the vegetables to CHOPIN Hall, Hope House and the City Mission. "It ended up feeding 139 people that first summer. I was really surprised," he said.

The project has continued, although not at Glenwood. People have donated the use of their backyards and other locations. Including land next to his home in McComb, Ohio, six acres are under cultivation. Nearly 20 students work in the gardens. Fresh broccoli, onions, potatoes, tomatoes, corn, peppers, zucchini and yellow squash are donated to various agencies in Findlay, feeding more than 1,000 people.

In 2010, Hart and his friends, Benji Balmer, Jay Reese and Robert Simon, incorporated as the MENTOR Initiative of Hancock County, which stands for Meeting Everyone's Needs while Teaching Others Responsibility. Under the new nonprofit organization, which is awaiting its tax-exempt status, people must help in the gardens if they want to receive a free weekly supply of fresh produce.

In 2011, Jake's Produce, a vegetable stand located on the corner of North Main Street and Center

Street, was introduced to generate income. Nine of the older student volunteers manage it. A part-time Americorp VISTA volunteer also helps organize garden helpers as the result of a grant co-written with CHOPIN Hall.

The MENTOR Initiative currently is part of a collaboration organized to address local hunger by the United Way of Hancock County that includes The Ohio State University Extension, Master Gardener Volunteers of Hancock County, Blanchard Valley Green Coalition and the Findlay-Hancock County Community Foundation. Hart also has worked with the Northwest Ohio Food Bank and was recently named to its board.

Hart has set his sights on an even bigger project. Hart envisions an aquaculture center as a local food system that would produce fresh fruit and vegetables year round, combined with raising freshwater prawn (shrimp) and fish. The aquaculture center also could employ people who need job training.

In addition to pursuing his ideals of mentoring students while feeding the needy, Hart is working with Wayne Peck, owner of Successful Solutions. In his new profession, Hart helps nonprofits to secure long-term funding, as well as assists individuals in planning for retirement. Hart and his wife, Sara, have a baby son, Jacob, who is the inspiration for the name of the produce stand.

Hart emphasized that it is important to work alongside the people you are trying to help and “get to know them as individuals, see where their real struggles are and be able to offer solutions.”

WLFC-FM to Broadcast UF Sports

The University of Findlay's on-campus radio station, 88.3 WLFC-FM, will be the exclusive broadcast source for UF football and men's and women's basketball. In addition to professional coverage of the games, the station will provide online updates via Facebook and Twitter, highlight clips during the games and include coach interviews at halftime and after the game. Since the increase in its wattage last fall, the station has the capacity to broadcast to 14 counties and touching areas of an additional four counties. The first home broadcast will be Friday, Sept. 10, when UF plays Northern Michigan. WLFC is northwest Ohio's only radio station specializing in independent label rock. Football

The University of Findlay football team fell 14-10 to Northwood University on Saturday, Sept. 3, in Midland, Mich. The loss gives the Oilers a 0-1 record on the year, with a 0-1 mark in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC). Junior running back Montrae Williams led the offense with 144 yards on 26 carries, while senior defensive lineman Jaryd Brown caught eight passes for 103 yards

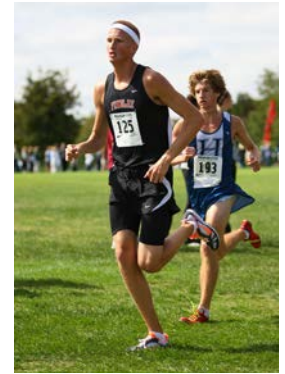

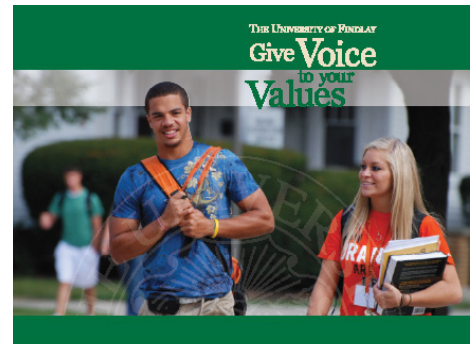
3010 – A Gift Supporting Every Student
